About Us

The care of places of worship falls squarely on the local community and especially its active members. They carry the burden of continuous maintenance and the raising of huge funds for repair. The Trust, founded in 1983, helps them with grants and loans and advice. We also offer funding towards improvements that enable the building to be more widely used in the 21st century, to projects that provide toilets and serveries, better heating and modern wiring. We also award small grants towards the repair and conservation of memorials and monuments, including those in churchyards. Since its foundation the Trust has offered over £2,000,000 in interest free loans and over £500,000 in grants for works of repair and improvement. We continue to give priority to making loans (currently up to a maximum of £20,000), as these help congregations to embark on a project with the confidence that they can manage the cash flow – and once work starts, donations often increase.

Alongside this main business we organize events which encourage everyone to enjoy and to understand the art and architecture of the county's churches and chapels. We hold an annual conference such as the present one, and we run church tours in the summer months. Our biggest fund raiser (about £16,000 in 2017) is the national Ride and Stride Day, which in Cambridgeshire is now "Ride, Drive and Stride". Participants can use cars as well as bicycles, horses, buses or their own two feet to visit as many churches and chapels as they can on the second Saturday in September. The money put up by sponsors is divided equally between the Trust and the church or churches nominated by the individual participant.

David Broomfield, BA, AAT, is Vice President of The Cambridge University Heraldic and Genealogical Society, Treasurer of The White Lion Society and a member of The Heraldry Society.

Dr Elizabeth New, MA, PhD, FSA, FRHist S, is Senior Lecturer in History at the University of Wales, Aberystwyth, and amongst other posts a director of Sigillum, the international association for the study of seals.

The Rt Revd Dr David Thomson, DPhil, FSA, FRHistS, FRSA is Bishop of Huntingdon, and Chair of the Trust, as well as continuing to study and write as a mediaevalist.

Dr Rob Kinsey, MA, PhD, is a medieval historian who continues to undertake historical research, alongside his work in publishing. He is also Treasurer of the Monumental Brass Society.

Chloë Cockerill, MBE, MA is a member of Cambridge University Heraldic and Genealogical Society, an Ely Cathedral guide, and most recently author, with her husband Tim, of *The Heraldry of Ely Cathedral*
