From the Chairman... NEIL MCKITTRICK

It has been a real pleasure to have been elected Chairman of the Trust in succession to Sir Hugh Duberly who retired after having served the Trust and many other organisations in Cambridgeshire faithfully and diligently over many years. On the behalf of all of us I thank him for his calm and reassuring presence at the helm of CHCT.

I have eased my way in by getting to know some of you and availing myself of the opportunity to join some of the church tours over the summer; the tranquility of Steeple Gidding and the angels on the nave roof [on a scorching hot day] at Outwell being 'stand outs'.

Perhaps I should tell you a bit more about myself.

It may or may not be an advantage that I am not a member of the clergy or an architect but I do claim a lifelong interest in churches and church life. I grew up in Ely in the fifties and early sixties and my family worshipped at St Mary's. I was fortunate to obtain a 'free place' at King's School and was confirmed by Bishop Hudson in the Cathedral in March 1961.

After legal training I lived in different parts of the country including the NE where as a man in his late twenties I embarked on the first of three churchwardenships [each in a different diocese] at St Cuthbert, Darlington, a fine Early English foundation. Much later when my wife and I moved to Peterborough, I became a warden at St John the Baptist in Peterborough, and still later at St Mary, Orton Waterville, the parish in which I live.



You will appreciate that although I worship at Peterborough Cathedral more often than anywhere else, I do take a keen interest in parish ministry and give my full support to those who wish it to flourish. Our parish church is literally and figuratively at the very centre of our community.

I am a solicitor by training but have been retired for some years. It was judicial work rather than private

practice that attracted me and in 1989 I was appointed the first stipendiary magistrate for Middlesex, although it is said that Henry Fielding [author of 'Tom Jones'] had a brother who was one such in that era. I ended up as a circuit judge for over eleven years successively in Peterborough and in Ipswich.

We remain heavily dependent on 'Ride and Stride' which has been a remarkable success story over many years and we must hope it will continue to be so. Many churches and chapels will have been the grateful recipients of funding to carry out important works. The need goes on. That event will provide the opportunity not only look back with gratitude but look forward to try to ensure that the Trust will remain adequately funded to take future projects to fruition. A very big thank you to everyone to took part in the annual CHCT Ride and Stride on Saturday September 10th – and indeed to those who used their imagination to try something a little bit different.

Let's start with a mention of David Pritchard, Vice Chair of CHCT, who decided to spend time at an organ console rather than on a saddle. David pledged to attempt a sponsored "hymnalong" at his parish church of St Leonard's, Little Downham and he strode along to the organ bench at 10.00am on September 10th and played until 1.00pm. He raised over £400.00 which is shared between CHCT and St Leonard's.

Grants



In the Spring Newsletter, I reported that grant and loan applications were well down with only nine applications for the year 2021/22. With two of the six meetings already held for 2022/23, the situation shows some slight improvement with six applications already.

However, of the grant/loan contracts sent out, only two of these have so far been signed and this is perhaps the real indicator of work about to get underway. One is Cambridge, St Paul, where a number of high level masonry repairs have been identified from a Quinquennial Inspection. The other is Southoe, St Leonard, where important tower works, including the provision of a belfry floor, are necessary before the PCC can tackle the much larger project of providing new toilet and kitchen facilities around the base of the tower.

Of works reported last time, the bells at Great Chishill, St Swithun, have now been augmented and rehung whilst the vestry windows at Wisbech, St Peter and St Paul, have been restored.
